

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SOM-19 Recommendation of Seascapes TWG

- I. Acknowledged and appreciated the presentation by Seascape Technical Working Group (Annex 8.1);
- Acknowledged and appreciated the conduct of CTI-CFF Sulu-Sulawesi Seascape and Bismarck-Solomon Seas Seascape, Technical Regional Exchange back-to-back with EAFM, Seascape, and Threatened Species Technical Working Group meetings hosted by Malaysia on 12–16 August 2024 as the collaboration among CTI-CFF Regional Secretariat, USAID SuFiA TS and GiZ–SOMACORE;
- 3. Acknowledged and appreciated the inclusion of the Lesser Sunda Seascape in the CTI-CFF Sulu-Sulawesi Seascape and Bismarck-Solomon Seas Seascape, Technical Regional Exchange back-to-back with EAFM, Seascape, and Threatened Species Technical Working Group meetings;
- 4. Acknowledged and appreciated the USAID SuFiA TS and GiZ–SOMACORE for the financial and technical aspect support of the CTI-CFF Sulu-Sulawesi Seascape and Bismarck-Solomon Seas Seascape Technical Regional Exchange back-to-back with EAFM, Seascape, and Threatened Species Technical Working Group meetings;
- 5. Acknowledged the 2024 M&E Report for Seascape TWG and the need to develop the reporting system and assessment mechanism (Annex 8.2);

- 6. Tasked the CTI-CFF Regional Secretariat to facilitate or explore the possibility of including discussions on the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) Conference of Parties (COP) within the CTI agenda, such as the study of the Coral Triangle Region to be identified as an Ecologically and Biologically Significant Marine Area;
- 6. Acknowledged the concern of the Government of the Democratic Republic of Timor Leste through the circular of the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and Forestry, Timor Leste No. 635/DGD/PAGRA/XI/2024 dated 2 December 2024 (Annex 8.3) to make a revision of the RPOA 2.0 with particular to change the word "transboundary" into the word "connectivity" and to remove the line which indicates national jurisdiction boundary;
- 6. Accepted the removal of all lines which indicated national jurisdiction boundary in Annex 4 of the RPOA 2.0 and retaining only the Coral Triangle Scientific Boundary and CTI-CFF Implementation Area;
- 6. Tasked the CTI-CFF Regional Secretariat to immediately follow up the removal of the lines which indicate national jurisdiction boundary in RPOA 2.0;
- 6. Approved the Seascape Technical Working Group 2025 Workplan and Budget;
